The Feast of the Epiphany

The feast of The Epiphany is the Christian celebration that commemorates the visit of the Magi (Three Wise Men) to the baby Jesus. It is also known as Theophany in Eastern Christian tradition. The feast falls on January 6th and marks the arrival of the visitors (the Magi) to the place where Jesus was born.

The Epiphany celebrates the revelation that Jesus was the Son of God. It focuses primarily on this revelation to the Magi, however, the meaning of the feast goes deeper than just the bringing of presents or the end of Christmas, it symbolises Jesus's presentation to the world.

Pope Francis reminds us to be like the Magi. He encourages us, as Christians, to ask questions as we set off life's journey and learn to worship Jesus.

In some countries the Epiphany is called '**Three Kings Day**'! It is celebrated in many countries including Spain, Portugal and Venezuela with a vibrant fiesta including a special Roscon de Reyes cake.

Whole School Mass – The Feast of The Epiphany

On Friday 10th December pupils in Year 1 to Year 6 will attend whole school mass at St Mary's Church. Children can be dropped at the church hall from 8.30am onwards which will give parents time to return to school to drop any year R children off. Early Bird children will be escorted to church by school staff. Fingers crossed for good weather as the children will walk back to school after mass. Please ensure they have raincoats and are wrapped up warm. We would be grateful for any volunteer parents to walk back to school with us as usual.

Winter Uniform

All children must wear a *warm coat* to school this term. Please label with your child's name so that we can return it to you should it get mislaid. We also would like all children to have warm *hats and gloves* please.

Although children may wear winter boots to and from school they must change into **school shoes** once inside the building please.

With the surge in winter viruses this winter we continue to mitigate against these by ventilating the school classrooms and reminding children to wash their hands. Please ensure your chid wear under layers such as a *warm vest* under their school shirts to keep them warm.

School Closure

We only make the decision to close the school in exceptional circumstances, and during the winter we should always be prepared for extreme weather situations, such as snow or high winds. Should the school need to close we would endeavour to give prior warning and alert parents via text message. We would also post a message on the school website and inform Heart FM radio station who announce school closures locally.

Spotlight

Jubilee Year

Pope Francis has given the 2025 Jubilee Year the theme of Pilgrims of Hope. What is a Jubilee Year? In the Catholic Church, a Jubilee or Holy Year is a special year of forgiveness and reconciliation, in which people are invited to come back into right relationship with God, with one another, and with all of creation.

How often is a Jubilee Year? A Jubilee Year is celebrated by the Church every 25 years. This has been the case since 1470, when Pope Paul II changed it from every 50 years.

A Pope can also proclaim an Extraordinary Jubilee, like the Extraordinary Jubilee of Mercy which Pope Francis inaugurated in 2015.



What is the theme of the Jubilee Year in 2025? The theme is Pilgrims of Hope. Pope Francis has invited Catholics to renew our hope and discover a vision that can "restore access to the fruits of the earth to everyone". We are also invited to rediscover a spirituality of God's creation in which we understand ourselves as "pilgrims on the earth" rather than masters of the world.

When does the Jubilee Year start and finish? The 2025 Jubilee Year begins on Christmas Eve 2024 and concludes on 6 January 2026.

Father in heaven, may the *faith* you have given us in your son, Jesus Christ, our brother, and the flame of *charity* enkindled in our hearts by the Holy Spirit, reawaken in us the blessed *hope* for the coming of your Kingdom.

May your grace transform us into tireless cultivators of the seeds of the Gospel. May those seeds transform from within both humanity and the whole cosmos in the sure expectation of a new heaven and a new earth, when, with the powers of Evil vanquished, your glory will shine eternally.
