Thank you to all those families who have made a huge effort with their child's punctuality! Getting to school on time means your child is more comfortable as they are going in with their classmates and can have a quick chat about the day ahead, your child does not have that awkward feeling of going in to class late and on their own and they do not miss the input for the first lesson of the day.

Last week 27 children were late on one occasion or more resulting in 38 lates marks. 7 children were late after the registers closed with results in an absence mark on their school record.

Anti Bullying Update

As part of our ongoing commitment to fostering a safe and inclusive environment for all our students, We would like to share some important information regarding our Anti-Bullying Week, which took place from the 13th to the 17th of November 2024.

From November 2024 to November 2025, we are embracing the theme of "Choose Respect", which encourages our children to treat one another with kindness and understanding. To kick off the week, we invited all students to wear odd socks on Monday. This fun and light-hearted activity served as a colourful reminder that our differences make us unique and should be celebrated.

Throughout the week, the children engaged in various activities designed to promote empathy and respect among peers. Each student had the opportunity to write a personal pledge, outlining how they intend to contribute to a positive school environment. More recently, the school council introduced 'play buddies' where two from each class choose to wear a red cap. If anyone feels like they have no one to play with they will approach someone wearing a cap who they know will be happy to play with them!

As parents and carers, your involvement plays a vital role in this initiative. We encourage you to talk to your children about what respect means to them and how they can actively contribute to preventing bullying. To help spark these conversations, you might consider discussing scenarios where kindness can make a difference or sharing examples of times when you chose respect in your own life.

Safer Internet Day

We would like to inform you about an important upcoming event that we will be observing at school—Safer Internet Day, which falls on the 11th of February 2025. This year, the theme is "Too Good to be True," focusing on online scams and the importance of recognising misleading information.

As we live in a digital age, it is vital for our children to understand how to navigate the online world safely and responsibly. Together, you might explore topics such as recognising suspicious content or understanding the significance of privacy settings. It could also be beneficial to discuss the importance of asking for help or reporting any concerning incidents they may encounter online.


